2008: Jeanne Wolff Bernstein

Jeanne Wolff Bernstein is the president, and supervising and personal analyst at PINC. She is on the faculty at PINC, NCSPP and The Wright Institute. Jeanne Wolff Bernstein is a contributing editor to "Psychoanalytic Dialogues" and is on the Editorial board of "Studies in Gender and Psychoanalysis" and "Contemporary Psychoanalysis". She has written on psychoanalysis and the arts as well on different schools of thought in the psychoanalytic domain in "Psychoanalytic Dialogues", "Studies in Gender and Psychoanalysis", "Fort/da", "Journal of Applied Psychoanalytic Studies", "Free Associations", "Recherches Cliniques en Psychanalyse" and in "The International Journal of Psycho-Analysis". She is in private practice in Berkeley, California.

In summer semester 2008, she gave a seminar at Sigmund Freud PrivatUniversität in the framework of the Fulbright-Freud scholarship.

2007: Ann Pellegrini (NYU)

Ann Pellegrini is Associate Professor of Performance Studies and Religious Studies at New York University. She is author of the books „Performance Anxieties: Staging Psychoanalysis, Staging Race“ (1997), and co-author of „Love the Sin: Sexual Regulation and the Limits of Religious Tolerance“ (2003), she co-edited „Queer Theory and the Jewish Question“ (2003) and the anthology „Secularisms“; as well as the queer studies publication series „Sexual Cultures“ at New York University Press. In summer semester 2007, she gave the seminar "Trauma, Loss and the Performance of Witness: Cultural Encounters, Psychoanalytic Engagements" at the Institut für Theater-, Film- und Medienwissenschaft at Vienna University.

On June 12, she gave the lecture „Trauma in the Public Imagination: Thinking after Freud“ at the Sigmund Freud Museum.

2006: Vamik Volkan (University of Virginia)

Dr. Volkan was on the Faculty of the University of Virginia's School of Medicine between 1963 and 2002. For 19 years, from 1976 to 1995, he was the Medical Director of Blue Ridge Hospital at the University of Virginia.

In 1987 he founded the Center for the Study of Mind and Human Interaction (CSMHI) and directed it until his retirement in 2002. Dr. Volkan participated in a six-year series of Arab-Israeli dialogues, a two-year series of Turkish-Greek dialogues, a two-year project in the USSR, a five-year project in Estonia, a four-year project in Georgia and South Ossetia. He also conducted assessments in Albania, Croatia, Hungary, Kuwait, Macedonia, Romania, and Slovenia.

Dr. Volkan was a Training and Supervising Analyst at the Washington Psychoanalytic Institute until 2003 when he retired and became an Emeritus Training and Supervising Analyst.

He was a founder and former president of the International Society of Political Psychology (ISPP), the Virginia Psychoanalytic Society and Turkish-American Neuropsychiatric Society.

In summer semester 2006, he gave the lecture series „Large-Group Psychology and Political and Societal Processes“ at the Institute for political science at Vienna University.

On May 13, the symposium „Psychoanalysis and Politics. Violence-Aggression-Regression“, which was developed by Vamik Volkan and others, took place at the Kreisky Forum for international relations.

2005 Mary Bergstein (Rhode Island School of Design)

Mary Bergstein is Professor for history of art at Rhode Island School of Design. Her book „The Sculpture of Nanni di Banco“ was released by Princeton University Press in 2000. She gave the lecture series „Freud, Proust, Photography and Art“ at the Institute of photography at the Academy of fine Arts Vienna in summer semester 2005, which was open to students from various disciplines. On April 6, she gave the lecture „Freud's Michelangelo: Vasari, Fotografie und die kunsthistorische Praxis“ at the Sigmund Freud Museum.

2004: Peter L. Rudnytsky (University of Florida)

Peter L. Rudnytsky is psychoanalyst and professor for English at University of Florida and editor of „American Imago“.

In summer semester 2004, Prof. Rudnytsky gave the interdisciplinary seminar „Freud translations“ at the Institute for History at Vienna University.

On May 18, he gave the lecture „How is Freud Relevant Today?“ at the America House, and on June 9, he gave the lecture „Did Freud Have an Affair with Minna Bernays, and So What?“ at the Sigmund Freud Museum

Jay Geller, born in 1953, is Senior Lecturer in Religious Studies at Vanderbilt University, Nashville, Tennessee, USA.

He has published numerous articles and chapters examining the relationships among gender, sexuality, representation of Jews (especially Jewish bodies), and the construction of Jewish identity since the Enlightenment. Currently, he is focussing upon the relationship between Jewish persistence and European subjectivities and nationalisms, as well as the role of trauma in the construction of pre- and post-Shoa Jewish identities and social networks. He is also exploring film in the study of the Shoa.
